Hold On No Matter What



I will strengthen you, yes, I will help you. I will uphold you with My righteous right hand. (Isaiah 41:10)

Whatever the circumstances, whatever the call, whatever the duty, whatever the price, whatever the sacrifice—God's strength will be your strength in your hour of need. - Billy Graham

As I was reflecting on my daily meditation from the "God's Promises" inspirational calendar, the two passages above stood out for me, and I must share my thoughts with you, my Covenant family. As we approach the end of summer and the onset of fall, many of us may be experiencing some uncertainty as to what will happen in the future with the virus. What will happen with the economy? What will happen with so many aspects of our lives?

In the midst of this uncertainty, we must move forward as we hold on to what we know is sure and steady. For example, I have always lived in a two-story home and have grown accustomed to using stairs. As a child I used to run up and down the steps, and I'd even skip a few without worrying about falling, never considering holding onto the handrail. And this was my practice for many years, until a few years ago when I slipped on the carpeted stairs and broke a toe. Now whenever I approach the stairs, muscle memory kicks in and I reach for the handrail. No longer do I run up and down the steps. I have learned to hold on to the rail for stability. We must learn to hold on to what is steady, tried, and proven.

In the Isaiah passage above, the prophet by the same name says that the Lord is our help and is our support and strength all the time, and especially during the tough times. In Isaiah, Chapter 40, the prophet speaks of the Lord as being a re-newer of our strength and a provider of durability. Do you feel as if you need extra strength? Are you feeling low spiritual energy? Perhaps you need the spiritual Geritol that the Holy Spirit gives.

The late renowned evangelist Billy Graham gave the above quote about God's strength in the time of need or low spiritual energy. If we were to sum up Graham's sermons, we would discover, that although his words were delivered differently or used different scriptural references and titles, his message was always the same.

Church Service Survey

ALZHEIMER'S...Know the Signs! Early Detection Matters

Alzheimer's disease is a progressive brain disease that disrupts memory and thinking, as well as reasoning skills. It may be difficult to tell the difference between age-related changes and the first signs of Alzheimer's disease. Here are 10 warning signs shared by the Alzheimer's Association.

Memory loss that disrupts daily life. In early stages a person needs to rely on memory aids like notes, electronic devices, or family for things they used to handle on their own. Asking for the same information over and over. Forgetting important dates of events.

Challenges in planning or solving problems. This person may have trouble following a familiar recipe or keeping track of monthly bills. They may have difficulty concentrating and take much longer to do things that they did before.

Difficulty completing familiar tasks. Someone with Alzheimer's may have trouble driving to a familiar location, organizing a grocery list, or remembering the rules of a favorite game.

Confusion with time or place. People living with Alzheimer's can lose track of dates, seasons, and the passage of time. They may have trouble understanding something if it is not happening immediately. Sometimes they forget where they are and how they got there.

Trouble understanding visual images or spatial relationships. Having vison problems is a sign of Alzheimer's. This may lead to difficulty with balance or trouble reading. They may also have problems judging distance and determine color or contrast, causing issues with driving. New problems with words in speaking or writing. They may have trouble following or joining a conversation. They may stop in the middle of a conversation and have no idea how to continue or may repeat themselves. They may have trouble naming a familiar object or use the wrong name, like calling a watch a hand clock.

Misplacing things and losing the ability to retrace steps. A person may put things in unusual places. They may lose things and be unable to go back over their steps to find them again. They may accuse others of stealing, especially as the disease progresses.

Decreased or poor judgement. They may use poor judgement when dealing with money or pay less attention to grooming or keeping themselves clean.

Withdrawing from work or social activities. They may experience changes in the ability to hold or follow a conversation. As a result they may withdraw from hobbies, social activities, or other engagements. They may have trouble keeping up with a favorite team or activity.

Changes in mood and personality. Persons can become confused, suspicious, depressed, fearful, or anxious. They may be easily upset at home, with friends, or when out of their comfort zone.

The Alzheimer's Association says that if you notice any of the warning signs in yourself or someone you know, don't ignore them! Consult your physician or visit alz.org/10signs for more information.

Larry Rappoldt, Director of Music

Covenant's new Director of Music is Larry Rappoldt. Larry earned degrees in music education from Gettysburg College and Wilkes University, as well as additional credits from West Chester University and St. Joseph's University. Since 1974 Larry has served as an organist for church services, recitals, and weddings. He has directed church choirs and various Christian vocal ensembles for 27 years.

For 32 years, Larry worked in the Coatesville Area School District where he taught band, orchestra, and music classes. During his tenure, the high school marching band was frequently recognized for their excellence, as was the Gordon Middle School band which he also directed. Larry also served as the district's Music Coordinator for 17 years.

Presently and for the past 12 years, Larry provides instrumental instruction for students at Conestoga Christian, Berks Christian, and West Mont Christian Academy. Recently he added the Music & Arts Center in Exton to his busy teaching schedule.

Larry and his wife Meg have been married for 40 years. They have two children—Laura, who is in her fourth year teaching, and Sarah, who is a senior a Kutztown University. Meg is a Human Resource Manager for the Devereux Foundation.

As Director of Music at Covenant, Larry will direct the Chancel Choir and oversee the entire music program of the church, a charge that he is obviously qualified to undertake. Larry will begin at Covenant on August 15. His first Chancel Choir rehearsal will be held on Wednesday, September 1, and the choir's first Sunday will be September 12.

Ruby Rublesky, Accompanist

Ruby Rublesky is a 2020 graduate of Millersville University with a BA in Piano Performance. During her time at Millersville, she had extensive experience in accompanying vocal and instrumental soloists, as well as vocal and instrumental ensembles. Prior to her affiliation with the Oxford Arts Alliance, Ruby served as a private music instructor at Creative Pursuits Studio and Cavod Academy of the Arts.

Ruby grew up in a musical Christian family including six children. She started playing piano at age six and started her own music lesson business when she was just sixteen years old. She has been playing and teaching ever since. Ruby's primary responsibilities at Covenant include accompanying the Chancel Choir and providing accompaniment for special music throughout the year.
