






For me, this invites us not to forget the past or the meaningful past relationships and the good times, but take those memories and learnings into the future with us. We as people of faith are called to be future-oriented and are looking forward to what's ahead.

No one expresses this more than the Apostle Paul in this passage of scripture listed above in his letter to the Philippians. He learned not to linger in the past, which for him was a period of disobedience and arrogance as he persecuted the followers of Christ, all the while thinking he was doing God's will. However, as recorded in Acts chapter 9, an encounter with Christ on the road to Damascus changed his life forever. From that point forward he became a future-oriented person as he preached, taught, planted churches, and led others to look forward to serving and meeting Christ as well.

No longer was he a person focusing only on what God had done, but on what God is doing and going to do in the future.

Adult Sunday School

Two adult Sunday School classes meet weekly from 9:00 to 10:00 A.M. to explore the Scriptures and apply their messages to Christian life today with the help of books by Christian authors and/or DVD presentations by Biblical scholars. Both classes have open doors to welcome interested adults to their studies.

With the arrival of Advent, the Faith Walk Sunday School Class is reflecting on Christmas with the "Light of the World" study by author, professor, and Biblical scholar Amy-Jill Levine. In the month of December the class will explore the first chapters of Matthew and Luke with Levine's DVD presentations, providing background and insights into the stories of Zechariah and Elizabeth, Mary Mother of Jesus, the journey to Bethlehem, and the visit from the Magi. This class was formed this fall by combining the Faith and Fellowship Class and the Ages and Stages Class. The class meets in the Chapel Library and is led by a rotation of teachers—Carole Horn, Chris Kimmich, Lois Neidermyer, and Cindy Smith.

The Sonshine Class continues to meet and fellowship in the lower level in the B1 classroom right by the elevator. By the middle of December they will finish their current study of James Moore's "Some Folks Feel the Rain, Others Just Get Wet." Then in the new year, they are looking forward to fellowshipping together on January 8 and starting a new 15-week study on January 15 with Moore's book "Seizing the Moments." Each chapter features people who have turned opportunities and special moments into realized dreams and provides relevant passages of Scripture. Jeannine Spece and Patti Willard alternate as teachers for this class.

On December 11 both classes will participate in the youth's Nativity Escape Room, a project they have enthusiastically worked on under the direction of Michelle Drumheller and Minister Brenda Wallace.



PATHWAY to Sustainability

"You are to walk in every pathway that the Lord your God commanded you, so that life may go well with you." Deuteronomy 5:33

When the Church Council met in October for a Saturday retreat, they had the opportunity to fellowship together and to engage in a meaningful discussion about the current status of Covenant Church and the hope for the future. The group explored the assistance offered by the Eastern Pennsylvania Conference of the UIMC through the PATHWAYS program designed to be of assistance to local churches post COVID. PATHWAYS is a process and tool for a church to determine God's calling and plan for that church to effectively share God's love within the congregation and within the community. Five different PATHWAYS were offered by the conference for any church desiring to be a part of the program.

Covenant's Church Council selected the PATHWAY entitled "ensuring congregational sustainability" with a focus on the challenges of increasing attendance at worship services and involvement in leadership, utilizing the church building as efficiently and effectively as possible, and securing finances necessary for the church to continue its mission of making disciples for Jesus Christ. Work on this PATHWAY will begin early in the new year with the assistance of our West District Superintendent, Rev. Jenny Freymoyer. She will facilitate the process with us to assess the church's current reality and to plan for ways to enhance our sustainability and growth for the future. More information will be forthcoming regarding the times of work sessions and the involvement of church staff and laity.

Here's to Good Health!



The topic for December and January is **Preventing Winter Illnesses**.

Preventing the risk of common winter illnesses begins with washing hands frequently. When you are on the go, using sanitizing gel, tissues, and wipes are a great help. Sneeze into the crook of your elbow, being sure to wash hands or use sanitizer afterwards.

Types of Winter Illnesses

- Colds are caused by a virus. Symptoms include stuffy/runny nose, cough, sore throat, sneezing, and a mild fever.
 Colds last 7-10 days.
- ◆ RSV (respiratory syncytial virus) is an infection in the lungs an airways. It comes with cold-like symptoms, along with wheezing/whistle like breathing that causes rapid breathing. Usually lasts 1-2 weeks.
- ◆ Flu and viral infection comes with symptoms of muscle aches, fever, headache, fatigue, cough, runny nose, and sore throat. If caught early within the first 48 hours, medication can be administered to help its duration. Lasts about 3-7 days
- Pneumonia is a lung infection caused by virus or bacteria. Symptoms are a cough with yellow or green mucus, chest pain, high fever, and rapid breathing. Bacterial pneumonia can be treated

with antibiotics and can last 2-3 weeks.

- ◆ Strep Throat is a contagious bacterial infection. Symptoms would be sore throat, trouble swallowing, fever, and possible stomach ache. Note: A cough or runny nose does not accompany strep throat. Strep throat is treated with antibiotics. Usually lasts at least 1-2 days.
- Stomach Flu is a viral infection in the intestines that can last 1-3 days. Symptoms include stomach pain, nausea, vomiting, mild fever, fatigue, and watery diarrhea.
- Covid Virus most often causes respiratory symptoms that feel like a cold, flu, of pneumonia. Symptoms can be mild or some people become severely ill. If you have these types of symptoms, please get tested to be sure it isn't "just a cold." If you have a positive test, contact your PCP and follow their instructions. Remember, the CDC says if it's a mild case, quarantine at home for 5 days and wear a mask around others. Continue to wear a mask around others for 5 days. Drink plenty of fluids and get lots of rest.

GROCERY CARDS


Please check the News to Go for Sundays when grocery cards will be available in the lobby.

Bible2School Starts Third Year for Fulton Elementary

Bible2School, a released time program for religious education, has begun its third year for Fulton Elementary School; and Covenant is delighted to host both second and third grade classes this year. The second grade class has six students, who are learning about God from the Old Testament; and the third grade class has nine students, who are learning about Jesus and the New Testament. Cindy Hean and Lois Neidermyer along with Minister Santa Jenkins teach the second graders on Mondays. The third grade class meets on Thursdays under the leadership of site director Julie Pack and other volunteers with Bible2School.

Students are still being added to the program through registrations with parental approval. Once a week students' lunch and recess time is used for Bible instruction and exploration. Adults volunteers walk the students to and from the elementary school, bringing the students' lunches with them. As the children eat their lunch, teachers present a story from the Bible and engage the children in discussion about it. Demonstrations, skits, games, and/or crafts further illuminate the lessons to be learned. All of this is accomplished in a little less than an hour per week.

Within Pennsylvania this year 35 elementary schools are involved with a total of 1,587 students as of November. The program has expanded since its founding in Manheim in 2012 with five schools and 450 students. Additional volunteers who are willing to give two hours a week are still needed for Bible2School so that more children can come to know God and Jesus. See Lois Neidermyer if you would be interested in helping with this dynamic program that can impact children within our immediate community.

Covenant's Youth are Full of Thanksgiving and Christmas Joy!

"Small But Mighty" is the motto of our youth department right now. I have never seen a group of more committed young people. They faithfully show up for Sunday School and Church weekly as well as volunteer to assist with many of the activities of the church. They have worked to make their space more presentable for themselves and the Bible2School groups. They have joined with the Women's and Men's ministries and actively participate in the meal preparation and the activities of the day.

Our youth group partnered with the youth of Faith United Methodist Church (Lititz) in attending the Youth Gretna Glen in November. For the past few weeks, they have been working hard to create an Escape Room under the direction of Michelle Drumheller. On December 11, they will host the two adult Sunday School classes and other adults in exploring the Christmas story through readings, riddles, and puzzles. If you are not in a Sunday School class but would like to participate in this fun-filled activity, please see either Michelle Drumheller or Minister Brenda Wallace. It should be a great time of fellowship and joy.

In preparation for 2023, the youth are exploring the option of attending Gretna Glen's Youth Blast, February 3rd -5th. Please take the time to let Bethany Beznoska, Jaedon Wallace, and Thearren Wallace know how proud you are of their work and faithfulness. We would also like to thank our helpers and supporters, Michelle Drumheller (teacher), Jeanine Speece, and Missy and Dave Beznoska.

Focus on Evangelism

Have you noticed the people God used to create what we call Christmas? I mean the people that carried out God's plans for meeting the needs of humanity? They were just down-to-earth, good natured ordinary people, one a young virgin maiden and another a carpenter. They evidently had a loving relationship because they talked about marriage.

Mary was the maiden's name. God sent an angel to her and told her that she was going to become pregnant and bear a son. He will be "the Son of God." God sent that same angel and told Joseph that his bride to be will become pregnant through the Holy Spirit and bear a son. You are to call him "Jesus. He will save his people from their sin."

Here is one thing that God wants you to get from this narrative. God plans to change the world, and God wants you to help tell the story. God hopes that you will be responsive to his voice, as were Mary and Joseph. Remember the words of Jesus, "Go into all the world and preach the Good News to everyone..." (Mark 16:15 NLT) The best place to respond to that call, is your home church.

Invite your family and friends to come with you to the 10:30 AM Sunday morning worship services during Advent. Offer to pick them up. Best of all, invite them to the 8:00 PM Christmas Eve worship service. Then gather the family together for an informal service on Christmas day at 10:30 AM. It will fill your heart with Christmas love.

Spread the invitation to neighbors and co-workers. People are more open to an invitation during the Christmas season, and especially Christmas Eve. Remember the first principle of evangelism is be friendly, Welcome everyone to worship. The best place to start is on the street where you live, like your neighbors. You may not feel qualified, but God is not looking for ability as much as he is looking for availability. God does not call the qualified; he qualifies the called. Merry Christmas!
