Suddenly a great company of the

heavenly host appeared with the angel, praising God and saying, "Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace to those on whom his favor rests." When the angels had left them and gone into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, "Let's go to Bethlehem and see this thing that has happened, which the Lord has told us about." (Luke 2:13-15)

One of my favorite Christmas songs as a child is one written by Bing Crosby and Carol Richards, "Silver Bells." This song captures the urban experience of Christmas. For your convenience, I have included the lyrics:

Silver bells, Silver bells, It's Christmas time in the city. Ring-a-ling, hear them ring, Soon it will be Christmas day.

City sidewalks, busy sidewalks, Dressed in holiday style, In the air there's a feeling of Christmas.

Children laughing, people passing, Meeting smile after smile, And on every street corner you hear...

Growing up in Baltimore at Christmas time was exciting. I recall a department store that would create the best Christmas displays in their window and how the crowds would wait with bated breath each year to see. In fact, stores and advertising agencies would establish the atmosphere for Christmas shopping as early as Thanksgiving. Each year the Thanksgiving Day parade would conclude with Santa Claus on the final float. From that point, the season builds over the next four weeks and concludes on Christmas day.

Because my parents were able to afford the amenities of the season, Christmas for my sister and me was very enjoyable. We had decorations that included Christmas lights, a tree, and the cans of spray snow for the windows. For Christmas dinner, we enjoyed the traditional foods: turkey, ham, candied yams, cornbread stuffing, sweet potato pie, pound cakes, and so forth. Most importantly, this was the time I received new gifts (toys). The process was actually very simple. I would provide the list of my desires to my parents, and they would deliver it to Santa. To receive these gifts, I would have to be on my best behavior until Christmas to assure I received what I had requested.

For me as a child, waiting for Christmas Eve was extremely difficult. I recall once asking my mother if I could go to bed as early as noon on Christmas Eve as a means to speed up the process. Several decades later, things have greatly changed. Both my mom and dad have gone to their heavenly rewards, along with other cherished

family members. I no longer reside in Baltimore, and the neighborhood I lived in as a child, should I ever decide to visit, is no longer the same.

Nonetheless, Christmas continues to provide me with warm fuzzy memories and continues to invoke a great level of excitement. Although I love to receive material gifts, my joy is in knowing that God's gift to the world, the infant Christ whose birth we celebrate each year on December 25th, grew up and carried out his mission of salvation.

Jesus called disciples, taught humanity about heavenly things, died on the cross to pay our sins, was resurrected, and now resides in heaven with the Father interceding for us.

I pray for the many people who do not know the "Christ" in Christmas or get to know our Savior and have a life changing experience. Perhaps God can use us to share the good news with those who don't know what Christ's birth is truly about. Nonetheless, for Christ followers, this is our season to share the good news, as we rejoice and cherish God's great love for us by sending Jesus to save us.

Changing Racism, A Worthwhile Event

From Roger Kresge, Lay Leader

2017 has been a challenging year. As one of the requirements of the Certified Lay Minister program, prospective CLMs must participate in the Eastern PA Conference's "Changing Racism" event, usually held twice a year at a hotel near our conference headquarters in King of Prussia. I attended the most recent one at the end of October; the next one is coming up in April.

I recommend it highly, but bear with me when I say that, while this is a challenging and worth-while event, it is not an especially enjoyable one. Don't go expecting to have fun! Attendance is limited to about 20 people in order to make it possible to have much more candid and intimate discussions. Most of the attendees are church lay leaders, active United Methodist clergy, and candidates for various levels of ministry.

The course description says participants will learn concrete strategies for:

- Developing skills for addressing and changing attitudes and behaviors that perpetuate bias, discrimination, and other obstacles to equity
- Understanding the personal costs to everyone of privilege and disadvantage
- Recognizing institutional racism and other forms of systemic oppression and discrimination that affect members of historically excluded groups
- Changing dysfunctional intra-racial and interracial behavior that undermine effective partnerships
- * Learning to acknowledge and interrupt the subtle (and often unintentional) dynamics that play out between "modern" forms of oppression and "internalized oppression".

One of the most interesting parts of the weekend was the several hours we spent discussing not just racism, but many of the other "isms" that permeate the culture around us, like ageism, sexism, classism, elitism, genderism, antisemitism, and many more. These "isms" are often used to exclude or even oppress groups of people

Cost for the event is \$300, including hotel, meals and materials. It's not a 'commuter' event; attendees are required to stay in the hotel. It runs Friday evening through Sunday afternoon. The next one is April 20-22, 2018. I'll be glad to try to answer any questions you may have.


- Electronic/online giving
