Hang In There?



But we have this treasure in jars of clay to show that this all-surpassing power is from God and not from us. We are hard pressed on every side, but not crushed; perplexed, but not in despair; persecuted, but not abandoned; struck down, but not destroyed.

2 Corinthians 4:7-9



Recently I saw an old poster of a cat hanging from a tree limb with the caption above displaying three words HANG IN THERE. Clearly for the cat it is much easier said than done.

In Paul's second letter to the Corinthians, he is highlighting that life is not easy, because we each will go through ups and downs, good days and bad days. Through these vicissitudes of life, what holds the person of faith and sustains them is what's on the inside -which is the Holy Spirit that Paul describes as a treasure. Paul uses several descriptors in his letter: hard pressed on every side, perplexed, persecuted, and struck down.

This reminds me of a television program I recently watched about an atheist or agnostic who was having a crisis in her romantic relationship. Ultimately the character seeks a psychic for advice and is told that spirituality is the solution. Because the character is not a person of faith, this presents another crisis. To make a long story short the character finally looks for comfort in a Bible that belonged to her deceased mother. As the character reads the Bible, a note is found that was written to God from her mother requesting assistance from addiction. After reading the note the character immediately reverts to not believing in God again, because her mother had died of a drug overdose. In her mind, if there was a God, her mom would not have died in this way.

For some people it's that easy to dismiss the idea of God and Faith; so many of them go through life trying to simply hang in there.

Sharing Your Faith

This statement was made by a Bishop of our church. He said, "I did not become a Christian because of a pastor, program, or congregation." While each of these played an important role in the growth of his faith, it was a teenage friend who invited him to her youth fellowship meeting in her church. "She told me about her relationship with Christ in a way that made sense to me," said the Bishop.

Did you ever stop to think that EVANGELISM is just that simple? Think about conversations you have with neighbors, close friends, and relatives. I suspect that most of our conversations center on things that we consider important, what we're concerned about. Recently, my conversation with a doctor turned into a discussion about what was happening with her teenage children in school and about her position on the school board. Our conversation with others is the springboard to sharing with others what Jesus Christ means to us and how Jesus has changed our lives.

The truth about evangelism is simply this: followers of Jesus care enough about people to get to know them, love them, and share their story about the difference Jesus makes in their lives. Evangelism must be grace-filled and-grace-fueled. It has to acknowledge that Jesus disciples have to earn the right to share their story because they have demonstrated how much they love. It must treat others as people precious to God. And most of all, evangelism must demonstrate that same love that Jesus demonstrated on the cross.

Sharing Jesus with others is the cornerstone of evangelism. Why not share your faith with each other in the congregation and thereby gain experience as one who can meaningfully share your faith?

However, thanks to Paul's testimony in the passage above, he shares that we will go through tough times alone. And for every struggle Paul listed, he highlighted God's power to sustain. While he shares about being hard pressed, he also highlights not being crushed. While believers are sometimes perplexed, they don't fall into despair. As a follower of Christ, Paul had been persecuted but never felt abandoned, and although struck down at times he had not been destroyed.

As we enter into this season of our lives, we must embrace God's power as our sustainer and share with others as Paul did, so others will know that we are not simply making it through life on our own but by God's grace. Contrary to what non-believers may think, we, as followers of Christ, are not just left to hang in there. We have Christ.



Some other reminders—Wear your mask in large groups indoors where many unvaccinated people could be gathered. When you have been out and about and get home wash your hands. If you are not feeling well stay home.

Covenant Hosts Bible2School

Covenant Church is hosting Fulton Elementary School students for Bible2School this school year in line with the national released time law for religious education. While the program was initiated for Fulton Elementary last year, it was delivered virtually via Zoom along with students from Washington Elementary School. This year children will come to the churches. Santa Jenkins oversees the program for these two schools as part of the endeavor to have B2S in all elementary schools within the School District of Lancaster. A number of school districts within the county have embraced this program, which is free for students. Registration is open throughout the school year.

Students in second, third, and fourth grades are invited to be part of the program, which is held during the school's lunch and recess time. Children are walked from the school to the church and back again. The Bible study program focuses on the Old Testament for second graders, the New Testament for third graders, and discipleship for fourth graders. Children gather by grade level for a Bible study presentation as they eat their lunch, and then they divide into smaller groups for discussion, crafts, and prayer. Many children within the B2S program have no church affiliation, and so the church goes to the children with the message of the Gospel.

Volunteer teachers and aides along with generous donations from supporters help to make this program thrive. More volunteers are needed for Covenant's outreach through B2S. Please contact Santa Jenkins at 717-992-7879 if you can give two hours of time to help on a Thursday or Friday.

Eastern PA Welcomes Bishop Schol

The Eastern PA Conference officially welcomed Bishop John Schol as its new episcopal leader on Saturday, September 18, in a worship service at the UM Church of West Chester, a church which he had pastored at one time. He now serves as bishop of our conference along with the Greater New Jersey Conference, which he has led since 2012.

In her greetings to the bishop, Eastern PA's Director of Connectional Ministries the Rev. Dawn Taylor-Storm said, "We welcome you home to the state of the best sports teams and to the historic roots of both Methodism and our rich EUB tradition." She went on to emphasize the new partnership and gifts that both conferences now share.

The Saturday morning service climaxed with the bishop's sermon that highlighted his three primary hopes for the conference's laity, clergy and congregations. He first expressed a hope for laity. "Today, my hope for laity...is that every one of you hears the calling of God.... God's got a calling for every lay person in the Eastern Pennsylvania Conference. And it's my hope that all of our pastors will continue to preach about everybody's calling, and nurture people into ministry."

He then encouraged clergy with his desire for them to "be yourself, not what somebody else is trying to make you, not what you're trying to make yourself into, but the person God has called you to be to lead in congregations and ministry, all across Eastern Pennsylvania and around the world."

The Ages and Stages Class meets in the Jesus Room downstairs and is currently studying Short Stories By Jesus by Amy-

Jill Levine. Through a DVD she presents her insights into several parables from her Jewish upbringing and her role as a college professor of New Testament studies. Discussion follows in making application of the parables to today's world. The next study will be If: Trading Your If Only Regrets for God's What If Possibilities by Mark Batterson, the author of the popular book on prayer Draw the Circle. The class teachers rotate turns for presenting the lessons and leading group discussions. Teachers include the Rev. Dr. Guy Carrigan, Carole Horn, and Lois Neidermyer.

The Faith and Fellowship Class continues to meet in the Library/Chapel room. They are presently studying "The Fruit of the Spirit" from the Fisherman Series and will focus on "The Ten Commandments" from the same series for their next set of lessons. Teachers Chris Kimmich, Cindy Smith, and Greg Smith take turns presenting the lesson and leading discussion in the relevance of the Scriptures for today.

The SonShine Class is now meeting in the Crosby Classroom downstairs right next to the elevator. They are currently exploring Philip Yancey's book through his DVD study on Prayer: Does it Make Any Difference? Believing that it does, they spend time in prayer along with discussion of the Biblical references and insights presented by Yancey. Jeannine Spece and Patti Willard share responsibilities for teaching the lessons.

These adult classes always welcome additional members who are interested in learning more about the Bible and its application to our lives today.

Finally, the bishop voiced his key hope for congregations. "My hope for every congregation is that you would get to know the people in your communities and offer them the grace of God," he said. "Not on our terms, but on their terms; not in our language, but in the language that connects with them. Not in the ways we want them to conform, but in the ways that God wants us to become Christ."

While the recent surge in cases of the COVID-19 pandemic limited onsite attendance at the service, nearly 300 viewed it via West Chester's UMC's livestream video. A recording of the live-streamed video can be viewed on the Eastern PA Conference YouTube page.
