The thief comes only to steal and kill and

destroy; I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full. (John 10:10)

When they kept on questioning him, he straightened up and said to them, "Let any one of you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her." (John 8:7)

While standing or saluting during the singing of the Star Spangled Banner before a sports event, fans understand that the game will not start until the last lyrics are sung, "O'er the land of the free and the home of the brave."

Following an attack on our nation in 1814 by the British, Francis Scott Key wrote the lyrics to the Star Spangled Banner with joy and admiration after an all night bombardment when he discovered in the morning that the flag of our great nation was still standing at Fort McHenry, assuring our nation had not been overcome.

Today, when Americans stand and sing our national anthem, are we merely following a tradition or truly understanding that since its birth, our nation has continually evolved to embody the words, "Land of the Free" and "Home of the Brave?" Liberation

and courage are not mutually exclusive but forever intertwined.



United States history provides the best illustrations of our evolution. For example, in the creation of the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution, freedom and rights were at the forefront, and our nation has continually expanded those freedoms by the exploits of the brave.

From the late 18th century to the present, new freedoms have emerged in a plethora of ways such as freedom from British tyranny, freedom from slavery, and the movement toward equal rights for all persons regardless of race, gender, religion, or sexual orientation.

Each battle that has been fought and won, whether inside our national borders or beyond, has allowed us to continue as the Land of the Free and Home of the Brave. We must never forget that each freedom came with a price that the brave were willing to

pay with their lives. They refused to follow the status quo, and simply said "No."

Our nation began with a few brave colonists who said no to Britain's tyrannical rule for the sake of freedom. Later, brave abolitionists would stand and say no to chattel slavery. Decades after that, brave civil rights leaders stood to say no to discrimination based on race. Women's rights activists stood to say no and break down oppression and inequality based on gender bias. Most recently, human rights activist have advocated for the LBGT community who has said no to sexual orientation discrimination. While the battles for equality process onward, we must admit that some major battles have been won, and we as Americans enjoy new freedoms.

In 1962:

"The Erisman Doll Hospital" building on the property newly purchased by the church was given to Landis Valley Museum where it is today.

The parking lot and foyer were dedicated.



Here's to Good Health

October Health Tips

Where did the summer go? Here we are in October all ready. Time to start thinking about colder weather and what we need to do to prepare our cars, homes and ourselves for the winter ahead.

I want to give you a few tips on how to stay health this winter.

- Be sure to get your flu shot.
- Keep washing your hands often, and when you can't use hand sanitizer. I know a lot of our congregation like to eat out. (I've seen you when I'm out!) Please use that hand sanitizer after you have turned in your menu to your server. Menus can carry all kinds of bugs.
- Eat healthy to stay healthy. Your immune system is what helps keep you healthy, and your immune system lives in your diges-

tive tract. So, we want to keep that gut in good shape. You need to be eating foods like fruits, leafy salads, and beans. Use healthy fat oils like olive and small servings of lean red meat. Eat chicken, turkey and fish.


- Research shows a Lancaster County favorite, sauerkraut, helps produce good bacteria in the gut. Some other foods that help build the immune system are red grapes, blueberries and cranberry juice. Foods should always be the primary source of nutrients that support your immune system but you may need to add a supplement like a probiotic, Echinacea and vitamin D.
- When you have the first hint of a cold coming on reach for elderberries, zinc, or vitamin C, which can help speed recovery.

- Cold make sure
- Even if you have a cold make sure you still get your exercise in.
 When you do exercise your muscles send signals that prompt immune cells to circulate and attack those germs.
- Finding quiet time with the Lord daily can help relieve stress and can benefit the immune system which can leave you less susceptible to illness.
- If you have a pet cat or dog snuggle up with them. Research shows that the bacteria found on their skin or brought in from outside can stimulate our immune system. Hold them close, they have the kind of bugs you want to let in.

Please consider the following in submitting nominations:

Leadership Team's Purpose:

- To prayerfully discern God's will for the church.
- To define the vision and direction of the church.
- To oversee all ministries and functions of the church.
- To provide spiritual leadership/direction for ministries.
- To facilitate resolution of disagreements and conflicts, or spiritual recovery.
- To build a family atmosphere and provide opportunity for Christian fellowship.

Member Qualifications

- Show evidence of the Fruits of the Spirit (Galatians 5:2223): love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control.
- Willing to cooperate, listen, learn, and grow in commitment to the church's ministry.
- Paid church staff members other than the senior pastor are not eligible. (Find paid staff members listed under "Church Staff" in your bulletin.)

Once all nominations are collected, the list will be reviewed, and the Nominations Team will then contact all qualified nominees for their consent. The final slate of nominees will then be presented for voting at a special Church Conference following the 10:20 worship service on Sunday, November 19. On that Sunday, three persons will be elected to 3-year terms.
