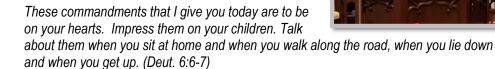




### From the Pastor's Desk...

And instead of "Leave It to Beaver," in our current atmosphere it would be to abandon Beaver altogether.

God knew that these things would occur, so God established some safeguards by giving mantras to live by in his Word. First, In the Deuteronomy passage above, the Bible says God's people are to teach their children the word of God through both our teachings and our actions. Thus, parents are responsible for children from conception to adulthood. And during that maturation journey, parents-whether biological, adoptive, or foster-should model what it means to be kind, loving, patient, and God fearing.

In Matthew's gospel highlighted above, Jesus observes the disciples keeping children from engaging Him, and Jesus responded by saying bring the children to me and do not hinder them. One way of bringing the children to Christ is bringing them to a fellowship of believersthe church. Not sending them, but accompanying them to the church so they may learn how to worship as well as learn God's word and become accustomed to volunteering their God given gifts and talents. We as believers must intentionally provide space for children throughout the church and welcome them.

In some of the old movies I used to hear characters say, "Children should be seen and not heard." There was also this other famous line, "Go away, kid, you bother me." Thankfully, Jesus would rebuke those statements and so should we as his followers.

Finally, Billy Graham, who was known as the nation's evangelist, suggested that the best legacy parents and grandparents can leave their children is character and faith. I interpret that to mean that those who come before us lay the foundation for those coming after by living a life that can be modeled.

Children's Day will be observed at Covenant on June 13, and we would love for the congregation to invite children to worship so we may celebrate God's greatest gift, children. Sara Petersen, our Children and Youth Director will have a special gift for each child in attendance. In the meantime, pray for all children.

### Here's to Good Health!

It's time to get outside and enjoy the warmer weather! That sounds so good! I just want to remind you of a few safety tips to keep you safe and healthy this summer.

As masks come off, we can breathe so much easier. Just remember who you are going to be around, how many people will you be with, and where are you going to be? As always remember to wash your hands often!

Keep the mosquitos away by getting rid of any standing water. Change water in landscape features like birdbaths and fountains at least once a week. Remember to check watering cans that have been left out. If you go hiking or camping, use mosquito repellent.

Check for ticks after hiking or camping. To remove a tick, use fine tipped tweezers to grasp the tick as close to the skin's surface as possible. Pull upward with steady, even pressure. After removing the tick, thoroughly

clean the bite area and your hands with rubbing alcohol or soap and water. Never crush a tick with your fingers.

These are CDC recommendations. Wear sunscreen, a hat, and sunglasses when out in the sun. Remember to drink plenty of water. If swimming, swim with a buddy; be sure there is a lifeguard; at the ocean face the waves instead of turning your back to them. If eating outdoors keep cold foods cold and hot foods hot. Always wash your hands before and after eating. Always grill outside in a well-ventilated area. Use long handled utensils. Be careful of loose clothing. When driving always buckle up. Don't drive distracted. Don't drink and drive. Never leave children or pets in a hot car. Carry a first aid kit.

### **Senior Farmers Market Vouchers**

The Lancaster County Office of Aging is pleased to announce dates for distribution on the 2021 Senior Farmers Market Nutrition Voucher Program. Each eligible participant will receive \$24 in vouchers to be used at approved farmers markets to purchase Pennsylvania grown fruits and vegetables beginning June 1.

To be eligible, seniors must be age 60 by 12/31/2021, live in Lancaster County, and have household income less than \$23,828 for 1 person or less than \$32,227 for 2 people. Seniors living in Personal Care or Nursing Homes are not eligible.

Mail-in applications are available. You can either have a representative take your mail-in application to a drive-up event and get your vouchers there, or you can mail the application to the Office of Aging. (There is a limit of 4 applications per representative.)

Due to COVID-19 and safety requirements, Senior Centers will NOT distribute the vouchers at any other time this year. Please note – Vouchers requested by mail may take several weeks to process. Mail in applications can be obtained online at www.lancoaging.org or by calling the following locations:
